Mark Freado: The Art of kid wispering

Reaching the Inside Kid Children's challenging and troubling behaviors are frequently the focus of interventions rather than recognizing them as externalizations of inner pain and distress. Beyond surface management lie the keys to understanding, reaching and teaching young people who desperately need the guiding light that a well-trained, caring adult can provide. The Art of Kid Whispering is the pathway to discovering the Inside Kid. Learning and practicing listening and decoding skills are essential to understand the private logic and goals that underlie a young person's difficult or self-defeating behavior.

Professionalism

Professionalism

"A professional is someone who can do his best work when he doesn't feel like it." - Alistair Cooke.

"Professional is not a label you give yourself – it's a description you hope others will apply to you." – David Maister

Professionalism is a prominent aspect of the ethics in our field of work and one of the six competencies in becoming a Child and Youth Care Professional (CYC-P). It is a common conversation amongst child and youth care workers, and something that many aspire to become. Despite this, professionalism doesn't always carry over when new child and youth care workers begin their work on the front line. This presentation will focus on new and developing child and youth care workers and their consideration of professionalism. Carol Stuart has said that "professionalism includes your professional demeanour or professional 'self' and your interpersonal interactions with young people, families, community members, and other professionals." As such the presentation will focus on these two sides of being a professional: the self (how the individual identifies their professionalism) and the interpersonal (how they interact with others and how that will influence the others' identification of their professionalism). There will be special focus on the ethics of the field, the competencies of professional child and youth care work, and perspectives from community partners and other professionals in relation to their interactions with professionalism in child and youth care workers. In addition to this, there will be a discussion of personal boundaries, or how to engage the self with others in an appropriate and therapeutic manner.

<u>Jonathan Dobbin</u> (B.A, B.Ed, CYC-P) is a Professional Development Coordinator with Blue Sky Family Care in St. John's. He started working with Blue Sky in 2010, starting on the front line and slowly moving into the position he currently holds. As part of this position he teaches Therapeutic Crisis Intervention (TCI), Children and Residential Experiences (CARE), Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training (ASIST), Straight Talk, and Tattered Teddies, as well as helps to manage Blue Sky's online training program. When Jon isn't working he enjoys spending time with his wife and three kids and writing.

Relationship & Communication

The Marvel of Family Based Care

In this workshop we will discuss our life space work in family based care homes. Participants will learn about the extraordinary potential that exists to provide therapeutic care in a family setting. Areas of discussion and relational practice interventions will include; safety, boundaries, relationships, integrating biological family, family and friends support, filling developmental gaps, becoming connected to community, building self-esteem, crisis interventions and the therapeutic use of daily life events.

This will be an interactive session led by 3 child and youth care supervisors who are also family based carers in their own homes.

<u>Kyle Lundrigan</u> is a Child and Youth Care supervisor at Key Assets. His experience in the field has been residential care, mental health treatment facility care, family based carer who has adopted the children that have been in his care through Key Assets.

Jaime Lundrigan is Kyle's wife. She has been in the field for over 12 years. Along with Kyle she has been a family based carer and an adoptive parent through Key Assets. She is one of the Managers of out of home care with Key Assets. She has experience in residential care and mental health and addictions outreach. She is also the current president of the Child and Youth Care Association for Newfoundland and Labrador.

Lesley Goodyear is the Manager of Family Services with Key Assets and family based carer within Key Assets. Her background in Child and Youth Care is residential care, in home family supports, Manager of the provincial mental health treatment centre and volunteer with the Child and Youth Care Association of Newfoundland and Labrador T3

Three Pillars of Transforming Care

Helping Kids Who Hurt. This workshop provides an overview on understanding traumatized children and the treatment of those youth in ecologies of family, school, treatment, justice, and community. Designed for those who work directly with traumatized children and those who supervise direct-line workers. Specific attention is given to the pillars of healing: safety, connections, and coping.

Addictions

This workshop will explore substance use and its link to mental health. It will look at the process of the addiction, taking into consideration how adolescence addiction compares to that of adults. It will also discuss the stigma that is often associated with addiction and some of the negative outcomes such as its impact on family. Finally it will look at treatment and recovery.

Transforming Assessment (PRO) PRO provides a new alternative to traditional deficit-based assessments. It engages young persons in conflict in the process of solving problems and finding solutions. The PRO assessment is grounded in resilience science, neuroscience, and ecological research on positive youth development. All children need support with six critical drives embodied in the Model of Leadership and Service: Safety, Belonging, Achievement, Power, Purpose and Adventure. When these drives are blocked, the youth is at risk. By addressing these inherent drives through interaction with caring, competent adults, a young person is able to take pathways to responsibility. The PRO assessment can be applied to a wide range of settings including regular and special education, juvenile justice, and prevention and treatment programs. The PRO assessment is particularly useful for students with chronic or serious problems that put them at risk for removal from school or placement in restrictive settings.

Relationship & Communication

A Place for Love: the expression of love toward children and youth living in care.

Love is a very small word but one with such an amazingly large impact on human growth and development. No one can argue that a key component to the holistic development of all human beings is love. As Child and Youth Care Workers know, the traumatic experiences of many children and youth in care have led them to question if they are loved or worthy of it. We believe every child has the right to love and be loved, no matter where they live. Unfortunately, CYCWs are exposed to mixed messages around love and how to express it to those children and youth that they work with. They ask themselves: is it okay to do this? Is it ethical to say that I care?

Our presentation aims to show that love is a key component of caring for children and youth living in care. Our goal is to discuss the challenges that arise in showing, and telling, our kids that we love them. We hope to differentiate the various types of love and show that there are many ways to express it professionally and genuinely. We hope to show that these forms of expression are ethical and support the latest research in attachment, trauma, resiliency, and human development.

<u>Jennifer Bolt</u> (B.A, B. Ed) is a Professional Development Coordinator with Bluesky Family Care in St. John's. She began working in the field of Child and Youth Care upon graduating from Memorial University in 2008. Jennifer spent four years working front line with at-risk youth as a CYCW and Supervisor and spent five years as Educational Consultant for Bluesky. She currently teaches Therapeutic Crisis Intervention and Children and Residential Experiences, as well as helps to manage Bluesky's online training system. Jennifer is also a member of the Coalition Against the Sexual Exploitation of Youth (C.A.S.E.Y). She lives in Bauline with her husband, three year old son, and puppy dog and is currently working on a Master's degree in Post-Secondary Studies.

Greg Taylor (BA, CYC-P) is currently a Program Director with Bluesky Family care. He began his career in CYC as a counsellor at a 5 Bed Group home in Carbonear, NL. While there he used to work closely with the youth and their families in transitional planning.

He then worked with Social Services (Now CSSD) for 15 years as a manager of Alternate Living Arrangement (ALA) homes. Then 10 years ago Greg accepted a position of Chid and Youth Care worker with Bluesky Family Care . He then moved into a Mentor Supervisor position with Bluesky and from there into management position and finally to his current position of Program Director with Bluesky.

Applied Human Development

The role of video games in Child and Youth Care.

This workshop focuses on both the positive and negative aspects of playing online based video games for children in care, as well as how we can set software controls to their activities as well as build trust Some areas of focus will include:

- Why games are so important to children, especially those in care
- The direct educational outcomes of learning: probability, expectancy value and spatial mapping •
- The social outcomes of community fostered by gaming •
- Positivity fostered by failure with anonymity no negative outcome for a loss when playing against strangers.
- What types of games should be promoted\what should not be promoted •
- Length of screen time that is healthy •
- Strategies to avoid power struggles of turning games off •
- Parent controls that could be used (helpful websites) •
- The negative outcomes: neglect, preoccupation, requirement of instant satisfaction, physical issues associated with prolonged sedentary activities.
- The idea of fishing, where experienced players/people take advantage of new players, similar to poker and gambling.
- Proper implementation and monitoring the idea about caring about what our kids care about.

Nick Walko grew up in rural Ontario in a family that fostered many at risk youth and eventually moved to the Toronto region to study business and work in logistics. Upon completing his bachelor's degree he moved Newfoundland to complete a Masters of Business Administration at Memorial University of Newfoundland while working with Key Assets NL. Nick is currently a CYCW for Key Assets and is completing a Masters of Education with specialization in post-secondary studies. As part of his Masters of Education degree Nick completed a course on Digital Game Based Learned. He also uses his practical experience gained by working with two youth who get different satisfaction from playing video games in staffed homes. F4

Applied Human Development

The Importance of Play

As Child and Youth Care Workers we need to use creativity and imagination when intervening with children, youth and families. Our interventions aim to promote development; filling in gaps when necessary, developing social connections, problem solving skills and so on. Play can help us achieve all of the above. Play gives children and youth the ability to tell us their stories, worries and fears, and to grow as individuals. Adults can benefit from the healing effects of play while helping their children develop. Play within the family strengthens family bonds and fosters healthier lifestyles. Play adds joy to life, relieves stress, supercharges learning, and connects you to others and the world around you. Play also makes work more productive and pleasurable. This session will offer some examples of play activities and their benefit for all ages.

With a background in residential, family support and working alongside foster parents, MaryAnne is passionate about the individuals she works with and the field as a whole. <u>Kim Furlong</u> is a Family Support Worker with Waypoints Supporting Foster Parents Program. Kim has extensive experience in the field of Child and Youth Care; having worked in residential, hospital and family support settings. Kim is a strong advocate for the children, youth and families she works with and committed to best practice approaches. Kim is also an avid gardener and oversees the Waypoints Community Garden.

The Power of Story

Everyone has a story to tell. Everyone needs to tell their story. Sometimes what is missing is someone who will really listen. In our own lives, there are many ways that we can control the narrative of our own story. Many of the hurt young people we encounter in our work have stories told about them. These stories are not their stories but the stories created and told by others. Those stories are told from limited or biased perspectives and based on narrow experiences. Frequently those stories are negative. As a result, many young people in our organizations, schools and systems believe they have no voice. Just one adult can make a difference, one adult who will listen and help find a forum for the young person's story to be told. It is also likely that when we are such a person, our engagement guides the young person to recognizing and discovering their story and the strengths beyond the pain.
